## The Challenges of Historic Allegations of Past Sexual Abuse - 16<sup>th</sup> February 2009

Garden Court North Chambers are pleased to present the first national conference on "The Challenges of Historic Allegations of Past Sexual Abuse" in Manchester on 16<sup>th</sup> February 2009.

The conference will address the challenges faced by both Care Home and domestic cases of historic sexual abuse and question whether the law can satisfy the expectations of victims and the public, whilst protecting those who have been falsely accused.

By bringing together a panel of expert speakers with a range of backgrounds and experience the conference aims to highlight the challenges faced at all stages of the legal process in such cases.

Our Keynote speaker, Lord Justice Hooper, provided the judgments in two care home cases of *R v Burke* [2005] *EWCA Crim 29* and *R v Sheikh* [2006] *EWCA Crim 2625* which highlight the prejudices caused by the delay and that in certain circumstances no fair trial was possible.

The overall question the conference will consider is whether there is a need for the law to develop further to protect the innocent or has the law ignored the rights of the victims of sexual abuse.

#### WHO SHOULD ATTEND?

This conference is aimed at all those involved in practicing criminal law, whether defending or prosecuting. It is relevant to solicitors, barristers, paralegals and is also suited to academics, police forces, social services and associated policy workers and support groups working in this field.
